## The Plastic Country

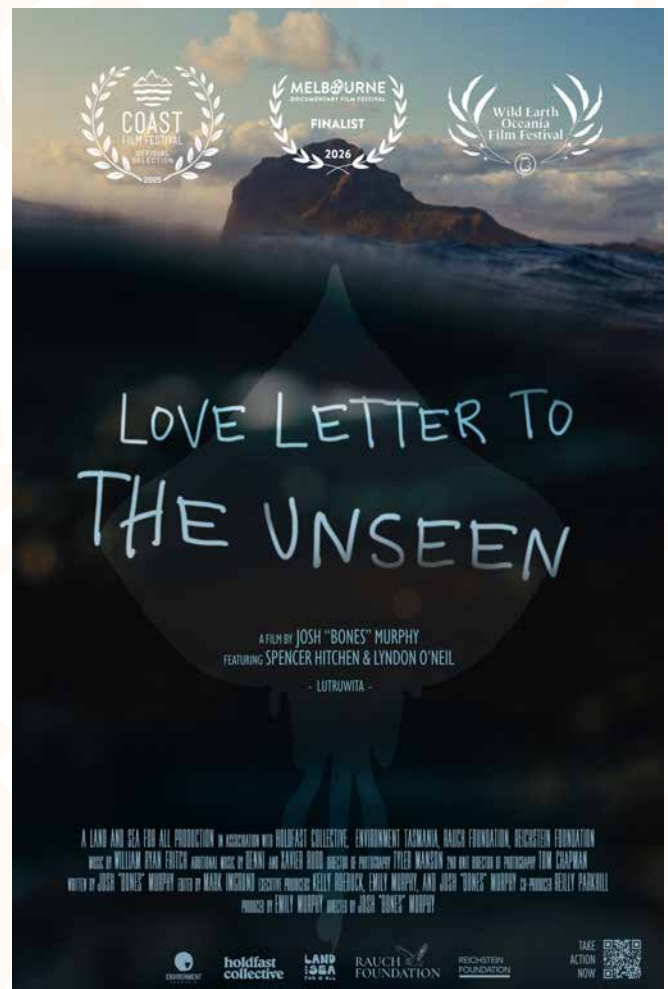

Kal Glanznig is a former water polo athlete turned ocean advocate who grew up surfing the beaches of Cronulla. Health-conscious and deeply curious, he becomes increasingly concerned by emerging research into the human health impacts of plastic.

But it's not until he joins a clean-up in East Arnhem Land, where Dhimurru Rangers pull ghost nets and plastic packaging from sacred shores - that his perspective is shattered. Realising that Australia is now one of the world's largest producers of plastic waste per person, Kal begins to question what this means not just for our environment, but for our bodies.

What follows is a journey across the country, from remote coastlines to wildlife hospitals and Parliament House, uncovering how plastic pollution is infiltrating ecosystems, politics, and human health. The Plastic Country is both a warning and a rallying cry - revealing solutions already underway and showing how everyone can drive the change needed to turn the tide on plastics for good.



## Love Letter to the Unseen

Macquarie Harbour, Tasmania, the sole remaining home of the Maugean skate, is at risk, but there's still time to act.

## A Life Illuminated

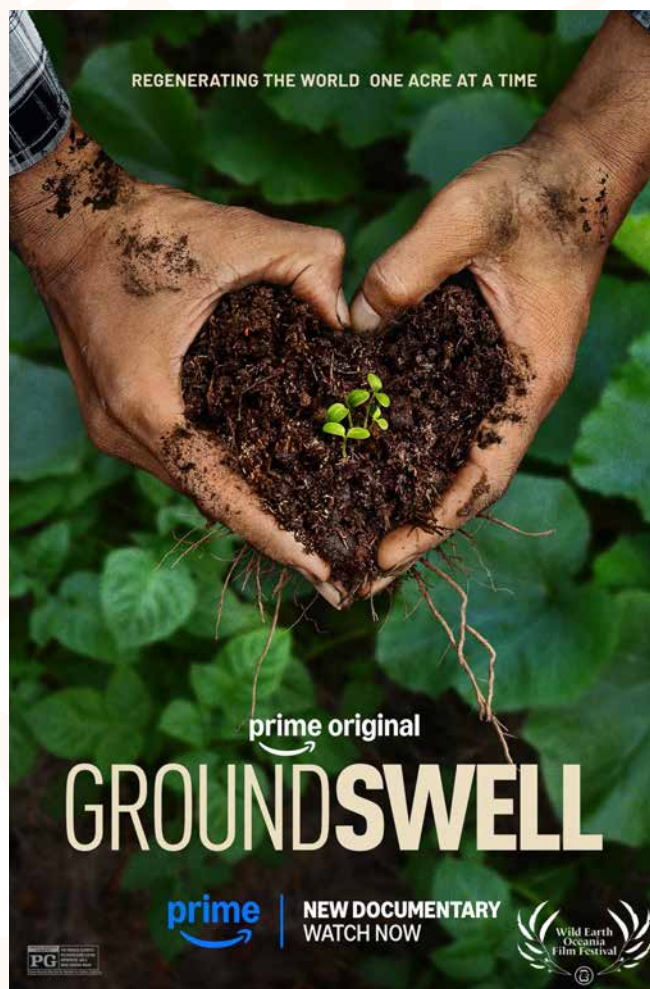

In A LIFE ILLUMINATED, marine biologist Dr. Edie Widder embarks on a groundbreaking journey to unveil the mysterious light of bioluminescence - a phenomenon that allows life to communicate in the darkness of the ocean's depths.

As one of the first women in her field, Edie transformed our understanding of the deep sea - once perceived as a dark and empty void, into a vibrant world filled with life and light. Known for being the first person in history to film bioluminescence in the deep sea, as well as capturing the first footage of the elusive giant squid in its natural habitat, she has transformed the world's view of our oceans.

Now, she embarks on her most daring expedition yet: a descent 3,300 feet beneath the ocean's surface to document a mysterious bioluminescent phenomenon she has pursued her entire life - one that could forever change how we understand life on Earth. Blending cinematic vérité footage from her journey into the deep with never-before-seen archives from her lifetime of expeditions, the film captures Edie's quest to reveal the profound beauty of bioluminescence while emphasising the urgent need to protect the fragile ecosystems of the deep sea.



## Groundswell

Take a journey across five continents to experience the global movement restoring food systems and reshaping our relationship with the planet, one acre at a time.

Narrated by Demi Moore and Woody Harrelson, and from the directors of Kiss the Ground and Common Ground - watch the Golden Globe winning documentary 'Groundswell' streaming worldwide on Prime Video.

As the official impact campaign, One Billion Acres is helping drive the movement toward 1 billion certified regenerative acres globally by 2030. Every action counts. People and companies from around the world can take the pledge now and make tangible commitments toward a healthier future.

Through intimate storytelling, Groundswell documentary demonstrates how regenerative approaches to agriculture can rebuild soil health, draw carbon from the atmosphere, revive biodiversity, improve the nutritional value of our food, and strengthen local economies. ## Yanuni

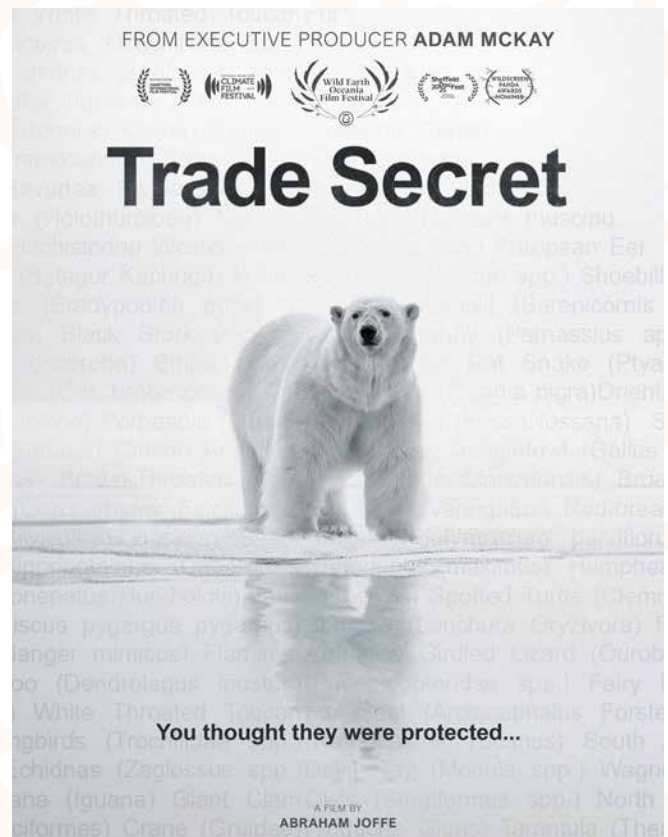

YANUNI follows the extraordinary journey of Juma Xipaia, an Indigenous chief from the Brazilian Amazon, as she rises from a remote village in Xipaya territory to the political frontlines of climate justice. A fearless defender of her people and the rainforest, Juma has survived six assassination attempts while confronting illegal gold miners, land-grabbers, and multinational corporations threatening her ancestral land.

Spanning years of activism and personal sacrifice, the film captures Juma's historic appointment as Brazil's first Secretary of Indigenous Rights under President Lula. At her side is Hugo Loss, her husband and the head of Special Operations at IBAMA, Brazil's environmental protection agency. As Juma fights on the political front, Hugo leads dangerous operations to dismantle illegal mining camps deep in the Amazon—often under armed threat.

When Juma discovers she is pregnant, her battle takes on new urgency. Navigating impending motherhood, rising political responsibility, and Hugo's high-risk missions, she is forced to confront the personal cost of resistance. Told with intimate access and cinematic urgency, YANUNI is both a love story and a call to action. It illuminates one of the world's most critical environmental and human rights struggles through a deeply personal lens. At once epic and intimate, YANUNI is a powerful portrait of resilience, Indigenous sovereignty, and the fight to protect the world's largest rainforest—for future generations and the planet we call home.



## Trade Secret

### What We Learn: Episode 1 – “Nature is my teacher” (Special Screening and Q&A)

**Directed by Simon Lister and Andrew Holmes**

Join photographer and storyteller Simon Lister (Netflix Tales by Light, UNICEF and UN) for a special screening of What We Learn, a new documentary series exploring education in the world's most unique and challenging environments.

Episode 1 travels to the jungles of West Papua, Indonesia, where Simon meets students and teachers of the Child Aid Papua Foundation. Here, children learn as much from the surrounding jungle as from any textbook — reading the forest canopy, immersing themselves in one of the world's largest biodiversity playgrounds, learning the rhythms of the tides, and carrying forward traditional ecological knowledge alongside core academic subjects.

Through Simon's lens, we witness other worlds through the power of an image and cinematic storytelling.

### Oceania: Journey To The Center

75 minutes

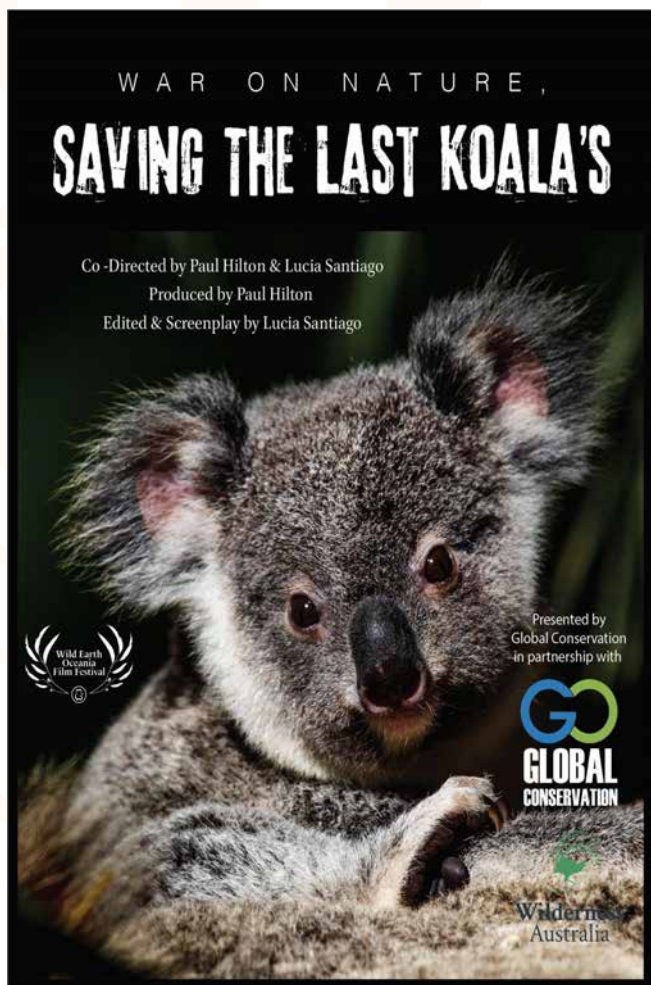
**Directed by Natalie Zimmerman**

OCEANIA begins at the center of the planet on a coral atoll – predicted to become uninhabitable by 2030 due to rising sea levels and temperatures brought by climate change. We journey with a mother and her adult son as they struggle to maintain their culture, freedom and independence. In the wake of decades of colonizing encounters, we soon realize our seemingly disparate histories, experiences and fates — are all connected.

Oceania is a lyrical documentary that explores climate change over 8 years through the eyes of two characters in the remote Pacific island nation of Kiribati. Tekinati is deeply grounded in her indigenous culture and environment, despite generations of Western depredation. Now, as the climate changes, her adult son Charles tries to find a path into his future which becomes increasingly disrupted.

Some Western environmentalists have viewed Kiribati and other Pacific nations simply as a canary in climate change's cage – their destruction proof of a climate emergency. In Oceania, we are offered counter-narratives that examine deeper geopolitical histories of colonization and the impact this continues to have on the I-Kiribati people and possible solutions for their future.





## War On Nature: Saving The Last Koalas

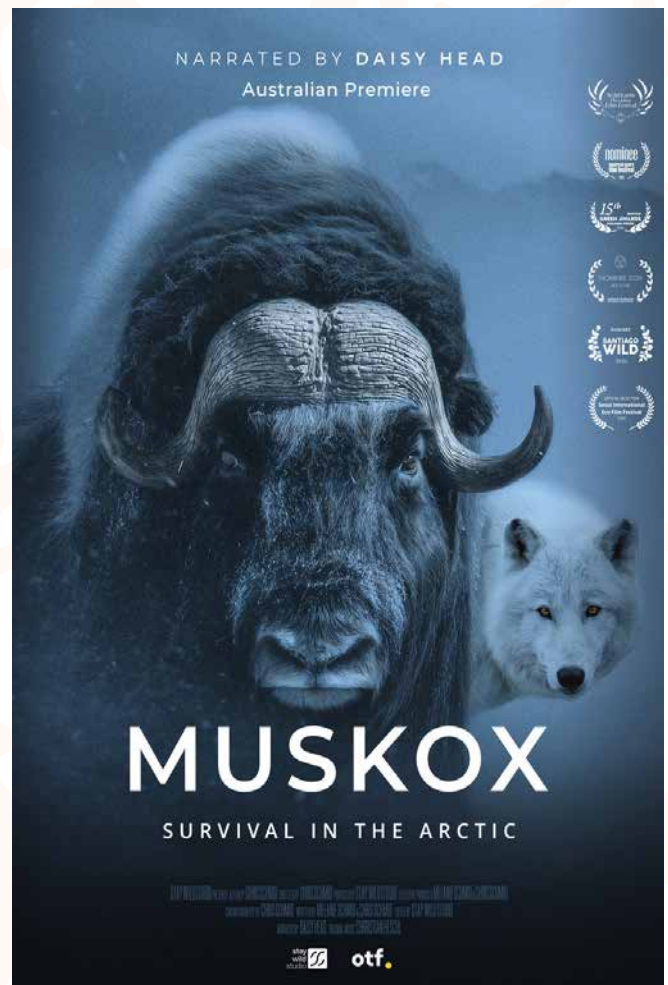

Australia is home to some of the world's most unique wildlife, shaped by millions of years of isolation. Among its most iconic species is the koala, a national symbol now facing a precarious future. In this powerful short documentary, conservation photojournalist

Paul Hilton travels through the forests of Australia's east coast to investigate the battle over the proposed Great Koala National Park. As logging operations continue in critical habitat, conservationists race to protect one of the last strongholds for wild koalas. Combining breathtaking imagery with frontline conservation reporting,

War on Nature: The Great Koala National Park explores the growing conflict between economic interests and environmental protection, revealing what is at stake, if these forests and the species that depend on them, are lost forever



## Muskox: Survival in the Arctic

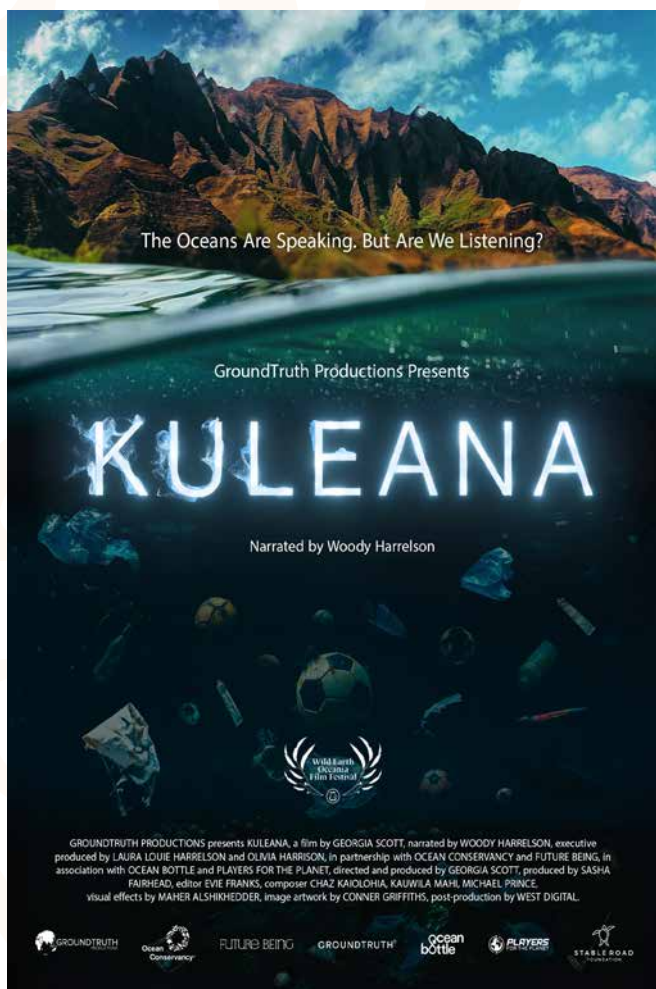

In the remote Arctic tundra, one of the harshest environments on Earth, a tightly bonded herd of musk oxen - ancient survivors of the Ice Age - endures a world shaped by cold, hunger, and constant threat. At the limits of survival, they rely on cooperation, memory, and collective defence to withstand predators and the brutal rhythm of the seasons. Filmed over several years,

Muskox: Survival in the Arctic offers a deeply immersive portrait of one of the Arctic's most iconic yet rarely observed animals - bringing to the screen a rare look at musk oxen in the wild. As the seasons shift, tensions rise within the herd, predators close in, and the long polar night pushes their endurance to the edge. In an increasingly unpredictable world, the balance between survival and loss grows ever more fragile.

Narrated by acclaimed British actress Daisy Head and directed by Chris Schmid, Muskox: Survival in the Arctic is a story of resilience - and a powerful reflection on the forces reshaping one of the planet's last wild ecosystems.





## Kuleana

By 2050, plastic in the ocean is projected to outweigh fish. How do we change course before it's too late?

Narrated by Woody Harrelson, KULEANA is a cinematic journey into the heart of the plastic crisis, set in one of the most ecologically and culturally significant regions on Earth: Hawai'i - now on the frontline of this global emergency.

Told through the eyes of elite athletes - surf legends, freedivers, and baseball stars - the film harnesses the universal language of sport to uncover groundbreaking science that exposes the invisible impact of microplastics on ocean life and human health.

KULEANA is more than a film; it's a rallying call for responsibility, and an invitation to join a new kind of movement - one that unites generations, cultures, and communities in defence of the ocean and the future we all share.

Between them, there is no contact, only silence, distance, and presence. Yet a bond slowly forms. Until the day Grinch disappears.

Between Breaths revisits this pivotal encounter, a film about memory, loss, and the fragile, invisible ties that bind us to the wild.

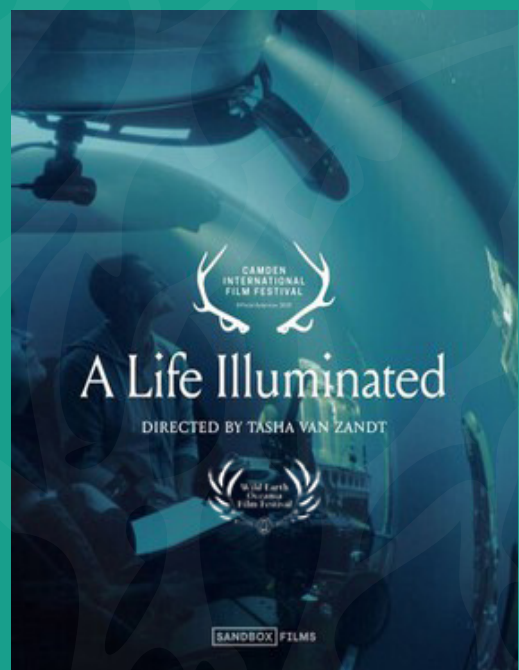
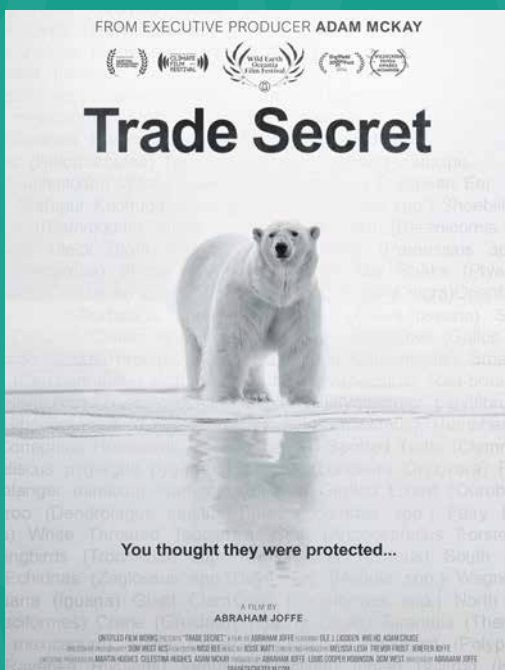
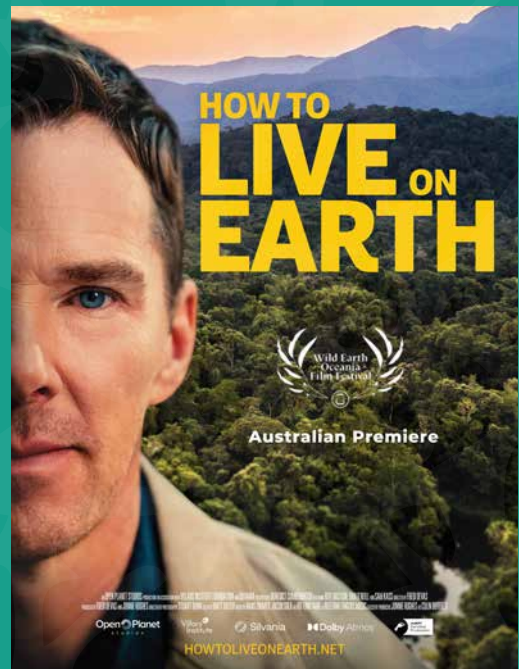
